4. REPORTS OF COMMITTEES & COMMISSIONS

Councillor Leslie Anderson

Heritage Select Committee, West Shore Parks and Recreation Society and Western Communities Policing Advisory Committee

Councillor Anderson provided an update on West Shore Parks and Recreation noting that they are managing within the established budget and that there were unanticipated fees collected for the filming of a Netflix production. She advised that there are two significant capital projects underway. The development of additional child care spaces is a significant undertaking and is on time and on budget. The arena floor replacement is progressing and is close to being on time and on budget subject to the availability of required materials. She also reported that there has been a large uptake in arts programming during the pandemic and that staff are managing programs and services very well within the COVID restrictions.

Councillor Roessingh reported that diversity, inclusion, and access will form significant parts of the Greater Victoria Public Library's Strategic Plan. He noted that Board members will be provided with training in these three key areas to increase their understanding and that he is looking forward to receiving the training.

Emergency Planning and Social Sustainable Committee

Councillor Stanton expressed appreciation for the number of Highlands residents who participated in the CRD Regional Parks Committee and Board meetings with respect to the proposed mountain biking guidelines. She acknowledged the efforts of participants to highlight the unsanctioned trail building and biking activities occurring in the Highlands and the resulting damage to the sensitive ecosystems and surrounding areas.

Tues. May 4th, Westshore Parks and Rec Society Owners Tour

The owners toured the extensive renovations being made to the JDF Arena building. These improvements are really well done and include a huge expansion of child care spaces, a new sprinkler system and energy recovery for the ice sheet.

"The new energy-recovery systems are expected to shave nearly \$20,000 off the annual electric bill at Juan de Fuca pool and about \$24,000 from the rink's annual total", said Wade Davies, Operations Manager at West Shore Parks and Recreation. "That's a huge savings to taxpayers", said Davies.

Davies also points to the environmental advantage, noting the new operating systems for the pool and rink are expected to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 62%, or 284 tonnes per year. That's the equivalent to planting 14,220 trees, taking 61 cars off the road or heating 54 houses each year."- courtesy TC Adrian Lam

The owners then met for an update by CAO, Grant Brown. Admissions are largely done by reservation as the COVID-19 protocols called for reduced capacity. The skate board park initiative has found a grant for 65% and is looking for matching funds. One of the new rooms at the JDF will be named the Highlands Room. All owners will receive naming as new spaces are created. Metchosin will be decorating theirs with artwork from that municipality and perhaps our council could consider asking our local artists for ideas on what might look good in the Highlands Room?

Minister of Municipal Affairs, Josie Osborne, and Citizen Services Minister, Lisa Beare, held a MS Teams meeting to discuss internet and cellular connectivity in BC. There is now additional funding available to help those without high speed internet or with poor cellular reception.

Wed. May 5th, 2021 CRD Performing Arts Facilities Select Committee

The committee's first meeting discussed the potential scope and function of a Performing Arts Facilities Service. Many comments were made about how to include the more distant communities from the core and create something with tangible benefits for all.

Wed. May 12th, 2021 CRD Committee of the Whole Special Meeting

The long day began with a Committee of the Whole Special Meeting. This Strategic Priorities check-in guides the service planning for next year and it was decided the current priorites be maintained. Feedback from directors was largely positive with kudos for the success of the Regional Housing First Program and a desire for more climate action and less waste.

The four pillars of the Strategic Plan are:

Community Wellbeing – Transportation & Housing; Climate Action & Environmental Stewardship; First Nations Reconciliation; and Advocacy, Governance & Accountability.

Wed. May 12th, 2021 CRD Board Meeting

Thirty delegations presented their thoughts and concerns to the Board on everything from Mountain Biking Guidelines, Old Growth Forests, the Solid Waste Management Plan and Regional Transportation Priorities.

The report highlights many notable achievements of the past year including the completion of the Wastewater Treatment Plant, the addition of many new affordable homes and the inclusion of First Nations in regional governance and decision making.

A Bylaw to move forward Langford's request to withdraw from the CRD Emergency Communication Dispatch Service was given three readings. The item will now come to our council table as it will need municipal consent before sending to the Inspector of Municipalities. The remaining

participants have asked the CRD for an RFP from dispatch service providers so we may compare prices. Langford's absence will not affect the cost of the service for the remaining municipalities of Sooke, Metchosin, Saltspring, Southern Gulf Islands, JDF Electoral Area and of course the District of Highlands.

The Solid Waste Management Plan was passed with the addition of item 4. That the Board:

- Refer the attached report from Zero Waste British Columbia dated February 10, 2021 to staff, to inform revisions to the Solid Waste Management Plan; and
- b) Endorse the goal of the CRD becoming a national leader in Zero Waste and the Circular Economy in solid waste management.
